Why not encourage your child at home to use real objects? Perhaps start with cups and plates if you don't already? This teaches many things such as safety, if they drop something, it may break. The weight of using real objects helps to build muscles to support writing and teaches children to respect their environment rather than leaving things on the floor to be trod on. Using real objects creates more sensory experiences for children as real objects can feel light or heavy, warm or cold.
