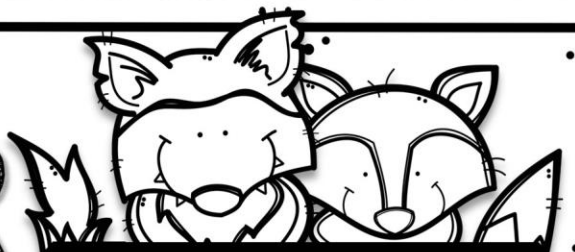

Topic: 'Autumn' **Main Text:** 'Robins Winter Song' by Suzanne Barton

This week we have enjoyed learning all about robins.

We have learnt that robins have a round head, large dark eyes, an orange or red breast that is a pattern and is totally unique to each bird. A baby robin is called a fledgling and are not born with a red breast. We discovered that robins eat worms and insects as well as fruit and seeds so are omnivores. Robins build round nests from moss and leaves.
